Keyword	Definition
cuisine	a style or method of cooking, especially as characteristic of a particular country, region, or establishment
export	send (goods or services) to another country for sale
import	bring (goods or services) into a country from abroad for sale
climate zones	are areas with distinct climates , which occur in east-west direction around the Earth, and can be classified using different climates . Generally, climate zones are belt-shaped and circular around the Poles (see picture on the left)
	
biomes	a large naturally occurring community of flora and fauna occupying a major habitat, e.g. forest or tundra. Visit https://kids.britannica.com/kids/article/biome/403913 for more information

fair trade	trade between companies in developed countries and producers in developing countries in which fair prices are paid to the producers
	
crop	a cultivated plant that is grown on a large scale commercially, especially a cereal, fruit, or vegetable
economy	the state of a country or region in terms of the production, consumption of goods, services and the supply of money
distribution	the action of sharing something out among a number of recipients
shipping	the transport of goods by sea or some other means
vegetation belts	vegetation zones, also called hardiness zones, are smaller, more-detailed vegetation regions. Vegetation zones divide land according to temperature and precipitation. Most gardeners look at a map of vegetation zones before planting any flowers, trees, or vegetables.

Fairtrade is a simple yet incredibly important idea – it's all about giving the people who produce the things you buy a fair price for their work.

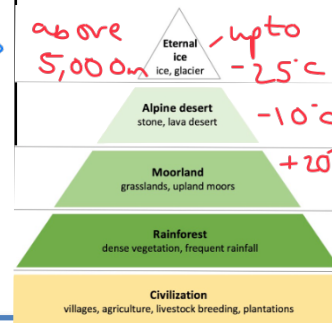
This may seem obvious, but lots of people in poorer countries have to sell their goods at prices so low that they can't make a decent living.
