 - North Sea
 - English Channel
- The Republic of Ireland is not a country of the United Kingdom.

- Use the compass points to describe the countries of the United Kingdom in relation to each other.

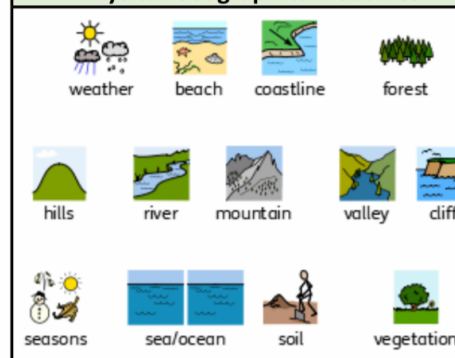
