Calligram

A calligram can be a poem, a phrase or even a single word. Calligrams use the shape of the letters, words or whole poem to show the subject of the calligram in a visual way.

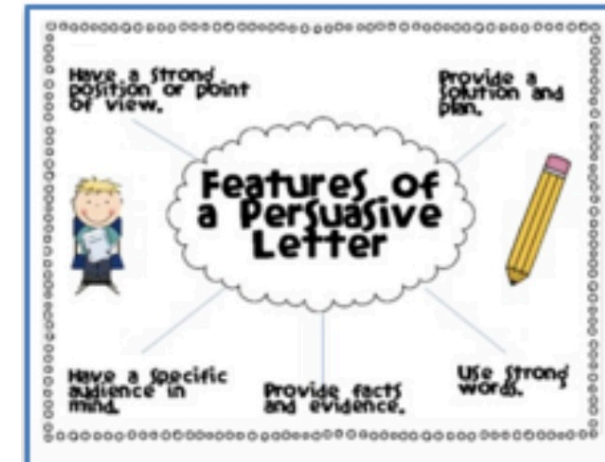
- Calligrams are known as shape poems or concrete poems.
- Calligrams don't have to rhyme.
- They form a shape which represents the topic of the poem.
- Sometimes they are written inside a shape.
- Sometimes the words themselves form the outside edges of a shape.
- Words and phrases can be stretched, squashed or distorted to show their meaning.

Fables



A fable is a short story that is meant to teach a moral lesson. Usually, but not always, fables are stories with animals that talk like people.

Persuasive Letters

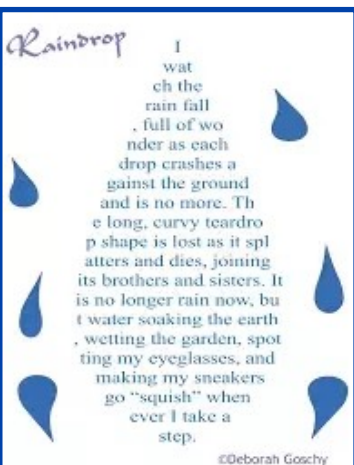


A persuasive letter is a letter that tries to convince readers to believe or do something. It has a strong point of view about an idea or a problem.

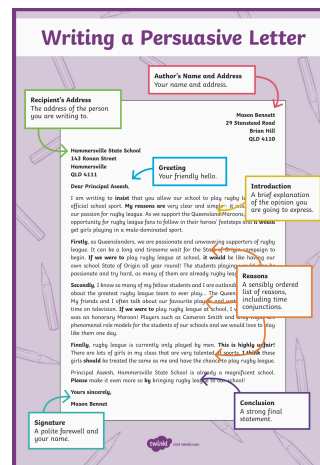
