Key vocabulary

character	a person in a story, play or movie.
villain	an evil person; scoundrel
hero	a person who is brave, good and often looked up to by others
intonation	the act or manner of speaking, especially with regard to pitch and its reflection of meaning
figurative language	to describe something by comparing it with something else.
opinion	a view or judgment, not necessarily based on fact
headline	used to grab the reader's attention
subheading	additional headline given to a paragraph of writing.
