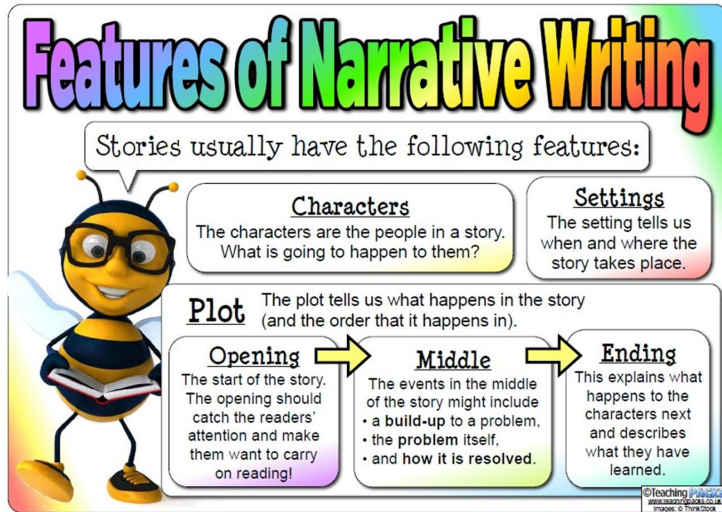


Knowledge Organiser: English - Fiction

Narrative



Novel	A fictitious prose narrative of book length, typically representing character and action with some degree of realism.
Setting	A description of the time and place within a story. This can include descriptions of the 5 senses.
Build-up	Events which cause an increase of tension/ action.
Plot	When the events in a story reach their most tense or extreme point.
Resolution	End of the story where the conflict is resolved.
Personification	Giving human actions to inanimate objects
Metaphor	A figure of speech used to compare two things stating something <i>is</i> something.
Simile	Giving human actions to inanimate objects

Punctuation and Grammar

Parenthesis: brackets, dashes or commas	a word or phrase inserted as an explanation e.g. <i>He finally answered (after taking 5 minutes to think) the question.</i>
Cohesion	when clauses, sentences and paragraphs link together so that the writing 'hangs together'.
Hyphens	hyphens are used to join words e.g. <i>My step-sisters like well-made pizzas.</i>
Inverted Commas	punctuation marks that are used in writing to show where speech or a quotation begins and ends e.g. <i>'I think I ought to warn you, they have had a traumatic experience,' said Mr Urquart.</i>
Relative clauses	clauses which begin with who, which, when, where, whose or that e.g. <i>The boy, who was very young, was crying.</i>
Conjunctions	a word used to connect clauses or sentences e.g. <i>when, before, after, while, so, because.</i>
Apostrophe	Used for both possession (e.g. Amy's ballet class. The parents' bedroom) and contraction (e.g. We're going on a holiday!)
