past - has already happened for e.g in history, hundreds of years ago


present - is happening now for example today

change - where something becomes different


Museum - a building in which objects of historical, scientific, artistic interest are stored and shown

History of toys timeline

- 1902**: In Germany, Richard Steiff based one of his toy designs on a bear he saw at the zoo.
- 1934-1949**: Lego was created in 1949.
- 1943**: Richard James invented the slinky in 1943. It performed tricks such as walking down the stairs.
- 1959**: Ruth Handler invented the Barbie doll in 1959.
- 1983**: Chris Wiggins invented Polly Pocket for his daughter in 1983.
- 1989**: The first Game Boy was developed by Nintendo and was released in Japan 1989.
- 2014**: Shopkins were created by Paul Solomon. They were first released in 2014.
- 2017**: The Nintendo Switch was released.
